Why Christians Give to Christian Schools?

We have just finished a very successful fundraiser that was put together in a short time by a few very devoted folks that believe strongly in Christian education. During the course of the process, we received many compliments and words of encouragement, as well as complaints and words of criticism. Through it all, lessons were learned, lives were blessed, and goals were reached. It got me to thinking... why do we fundraise and ask others to give to our Christian School?

Years ago as a young Christian, my idea of giving to our church was to occasionally throw a few dollars in the basket as it went by. We were a young family with a single income and three young children at home. We were paying a mortgage that was too big for our budget during the years of runaway inflation. Our church began a building project and sent the deacons out to encourage us to sacrificially give. We felt led to participate and began to give systematically over the next couple of years. We discovered that we actually had more money available during this period as we gave and the Lord blessed! When the building commitment ended, we continued to give both in a planned way and also as the Lord prompted. We continued to discover that the Lord often blessed us through our giving more than those to whom we were giving to.

At Covenant Christian School, there

are several facts that all parents need to be aware of. First, while we strive to operate from a balanced budget each year, generally 10-15% of the budget is unfunded. This is due to smaller enrollment than anticipated, class size issues, unanticipated cost increases or needs, such as three new air conditioning units, and the desire to keep tuition as affordable as possible. Second, any growth or improvements that we desire to make are unfunded and need donations to make them possible. Third, there are many people in our community that desire Christian education, but cannot afford it and need help to make their dream a reality. In addition, there are many during these tough economic times who need temporary help to keep their children in Christian education. How do we close this gap and continue to make our school better?

The answer is through the generous giving of our school family and ...fundraising. Why should we ask others to give to Christian education? Here are several reasons.

- **Christian education is currently the only place that teaches children absolute truth and the Word of God.** All other educational entities have curriculum that is steeped in relative truth and human philosophy.
- **The vast majority of Christian school educators educate students for less money and provide a better education.** Standardized test scores validate that our education is spiritually and academically superior at a tuition cost that is considerably less than the taxpayer pays.

- **Our future expansion and program growth will depend on gift income rather than tuition and fees.** New technology, academic programs and extracurricular activities all cost money.
- **Giving equalizes the sacrifice of the Christian school staff.** Have you ever thought of the sacrifice the teachers and administration make in accepting less in salaries than they would make in the public sector? The Apostle Paul said, "do good unto all men, especially those of the household of faith."
- **Christian education doesn't cost; it pays.** The spiritual, moral, and academic instruction our students receive will benefit the student personally and the world in general for many years after other gifts have worn out or become obsolete.

The investment that you have made by giving of your time, talents, and finances to Covenant Christian School is eternal. Thank you for your investment in eternity. 🙏

As everyone finished their walking,

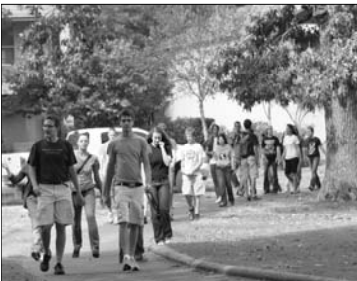

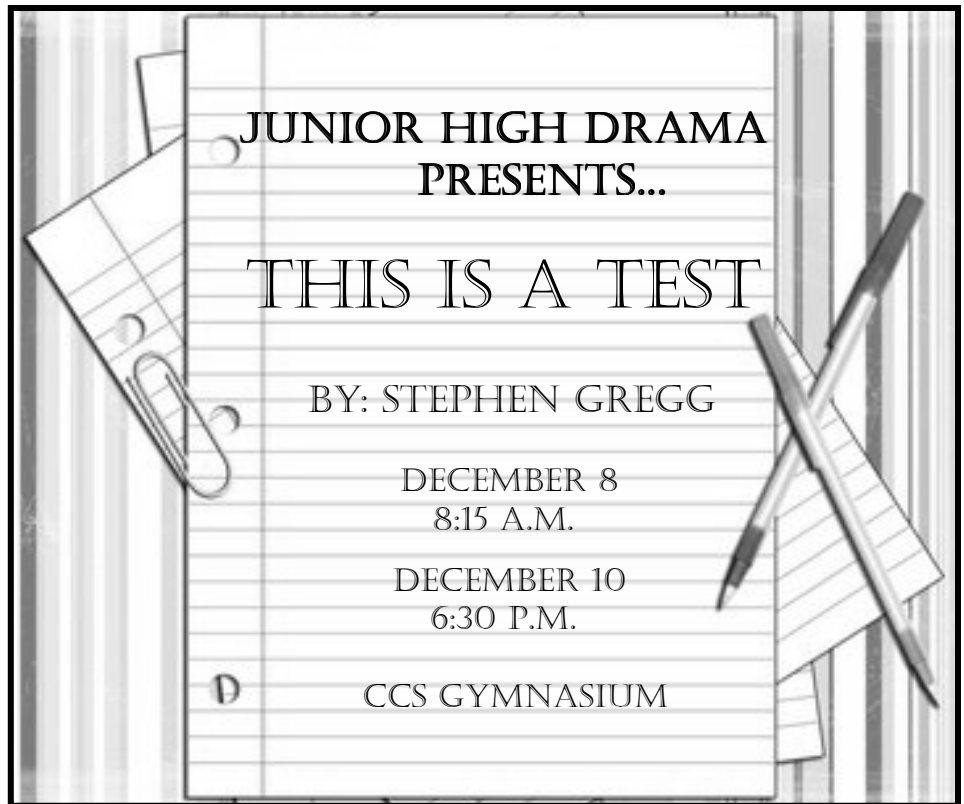
